The Hartford Foundation for Public Giving

- Established in 1925 to serve as the community foundation for the Greater Hartford, CT region.
- Serving 29 towns, hundreds of nonprofits and more than 760,000 residents.
- Endowed funds of over \$1.2 billion allowed the Foundation to make grants of over \$54 million in 2022, and over \$940 million since 1925.

What does it mean to dismantle structural racism?

- **Shifting power**: Change the makeup of who benefits from opportunity and who makes decisions about practice, policy and allocation of resources.
- Building equity: Support and lead efforts to change organizational and systemic policies and practice to advance racial and ethnic equity.
- **Influencing attitudes and beliefs:** Support and lead awareness, education, training and movement building to address individual, organizational and systemic biases.

While dismantling structural racism requires a long-term commitment, the time to act is now. We know it won't be easy, but working together, we can achieve greater equity in our region.





Community Index scores vary by town within Greater Hartford







TOWNS | MEDIAN HOUSEHOLD INCOME IN 2020 DOLLARS,






Wealth Gap

The median net worth of Black households was less than 15% that of White families in 2019.






Housing Costs








Mortgage Applications

Black and Latino mortgage applicants have higher rejection rates




